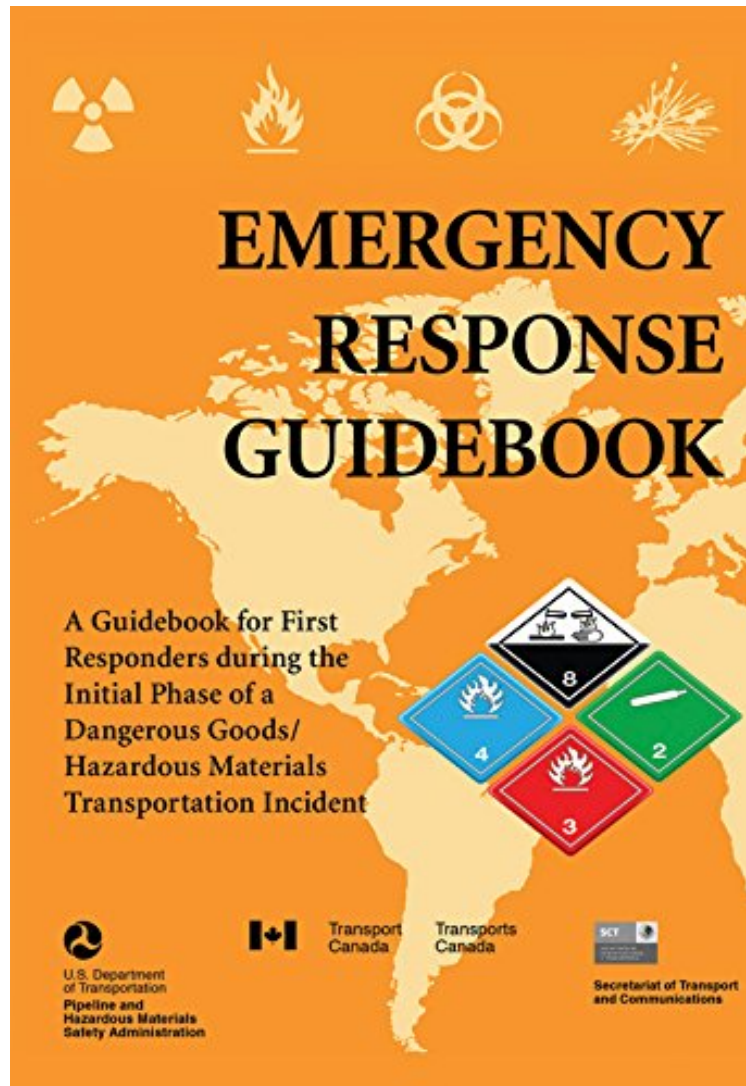

A great source of information once you master the use of it. I would recommend this for professionals or just the curious.
