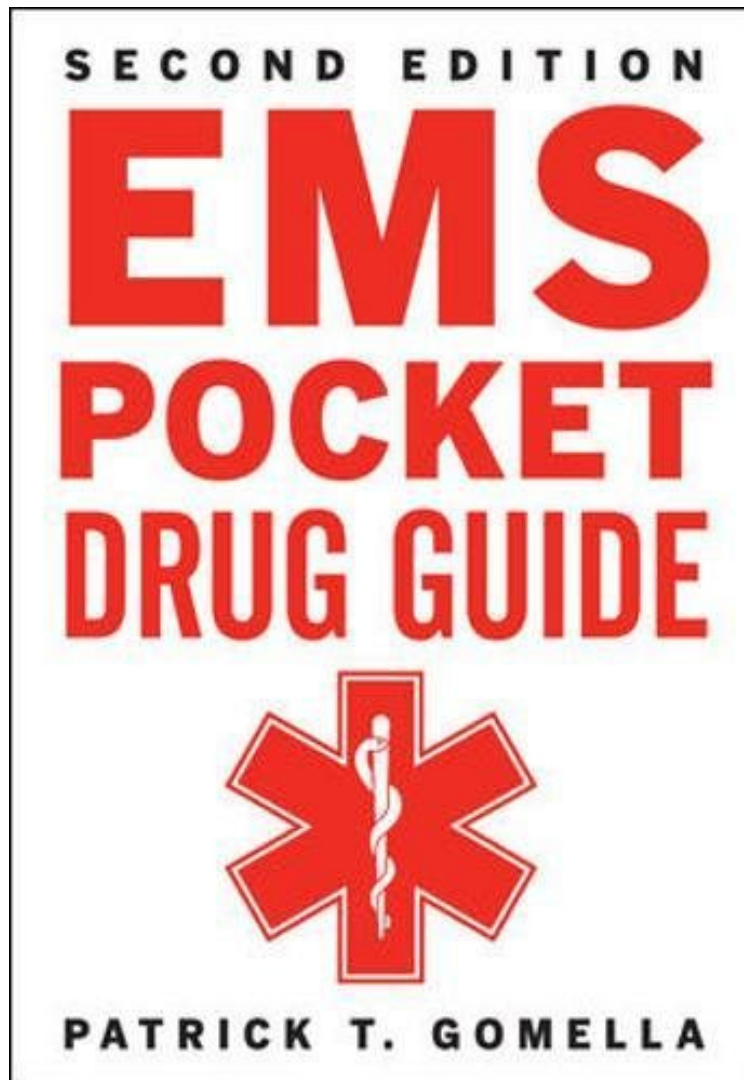

Compact too, like 4"x3"x .75" but still has very clear print for those with far-sightedness to read, like myself. Has over 1k commonly used prescriptions, signs/symptoms of OD, and common street drugs. It lists the drug with its other names along with contraindications, etc, and a section that breaks down drugs by body system ((like what to use, when)). The only real "complaint" I have with this book is that unlike a dictionary, the start/stop words are not listed on the outer edge of the pages alongside the page number, but listed on the inside of the pages towards the binding. This however is not a dealbreaker for me, as the index is handy enough to quickly find the page number, then just flip back to said page.
